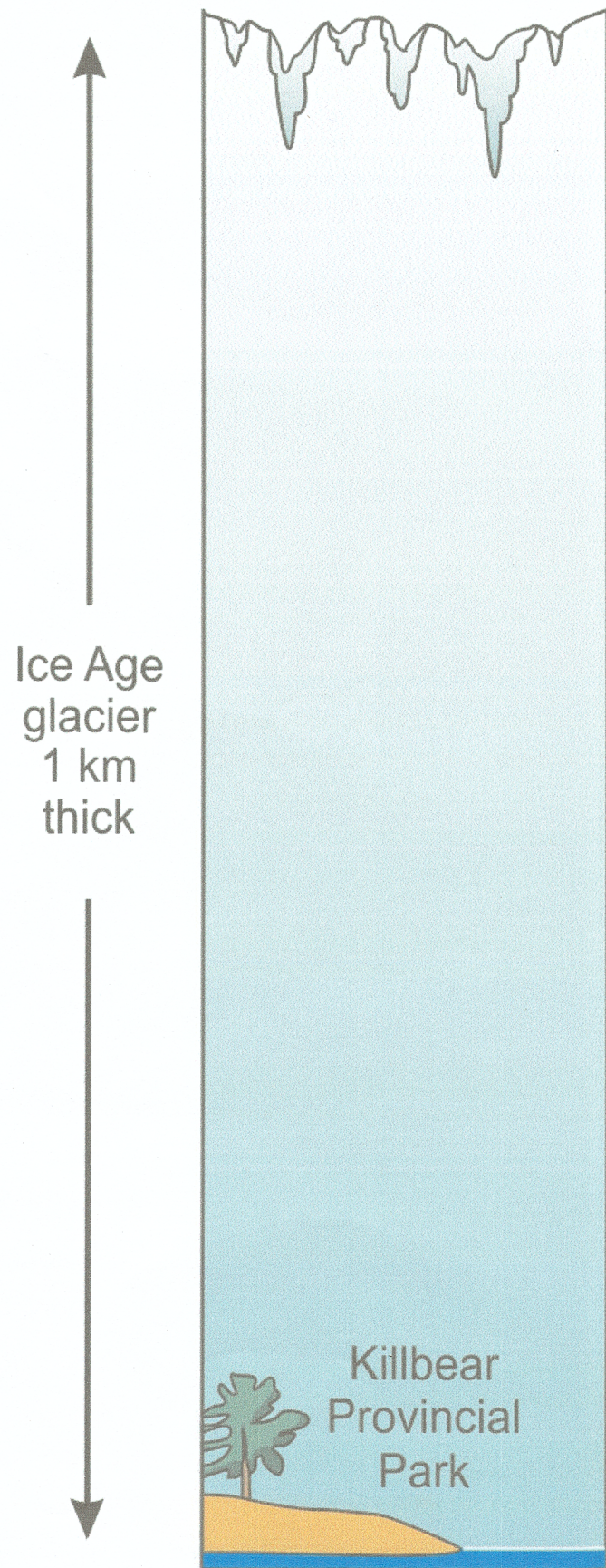
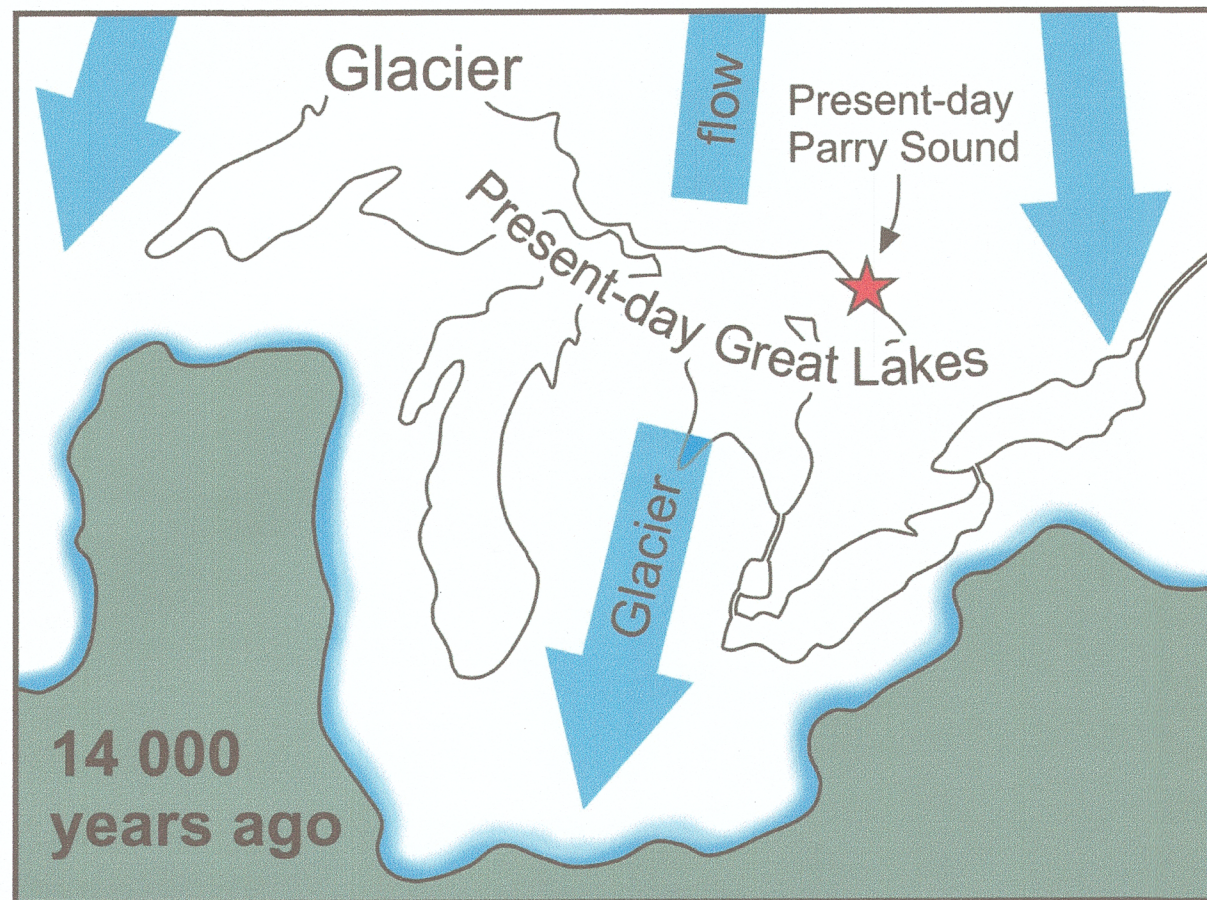


Parry Sound



Imagining an Ice Age

Fourteen thousand years ago, the Parry Sound region lay below at least a kilometre of slow-moving glacial ice. This was the final stage of the Ice Age, a time over the past 2 million years when vast ice sheets covered much of Canada and advanced and melted back many times. Sand, mud and stones lodged in the base of the ice scratched, ground and polished the rock surface below, sculpting today's familiar rocky landscapes of the Canadian Shield.



During the final stage of the Ice Age, glaciers flowed south across the Great Lakes region.
